Next year calendar-

Many of you are perhaps wondering why the early-release day has been changed to Thursday for the 2014-15 school year. There are several reasons for this change, and I will be sharing them in each week's Friday Update.

Quality of education drives all of our decisions. We were privileged enough to have received a large grant a couple of years ago from the U.S. Department of Education. Part of what we vowed to do within the scope of this grant was to improve our attendance. Waldorf education is considered "live" education because each lesson is created by the teacher, specifically catered to each class, and then "served fresh daily". To fully digest main lesson content, attendance is not only important, it is essential.

Why this tangent about attendance and grants? Because our attendance improved significantly last year and into the first semester of this year. With the institution of the early-release day on Fridays during this spring semester, the number of absences on Friday virtually doubled. While it may seem that missing a half-day is inconsequential, the first part of the day holds the curricular gem in a Waldorf school. Children who miss Friday's morning lesson on a regular basis are in essence missing one-fifth of their studies. Teachers took note of this while planning the calendar for next year.

APC News-

Hello Birchtree families! We have already begun to receive feedback from families from the surveys we sent out. Please fill out an online survey before April 7, if you have not done so already. Your input is invaluable.

We had some excellent suggestions from our Pedagogical Consultant Prairie Adams who provided us with a special Mission Moment to begin our meeting and also provided some excellent suggestions for future evaluations of our school and how well it is meeting the needs of our students and community.

We approved what appears to be an increase in the pupil to teacher ratio, but is actually a return to the original ratio that we reduced last year.

We approved new procedures to ameliorate any errors in the lottery process.

We approved changing the day of early release from Friday to Thursday beginning in Fall, 2014. This last change was made after lengthy discussion and was not made lightly. The APC Board realizes that many parents prefer an early release on Friday, however the purpose of the Early Release is not to provide a three-day weekend to our students. The purpose is to provide teachers with an opportunity for education. To that end, Thursday is the most common day for early release in Waldorf education for many reasons, including rhythm and attendance. We hope this change will not be too inconvenient. We are exploring many after school options including the Menard Center, the AT&T Sport Center and on-campus child care for families who need assistance on early-release days.

Finally, it is possible we will have portables next year. Anyone who wishes to join in the discussion is encouraged to speak with Mr. Klauder about joining the Building Expansion Committee.

Our next meeting will be Wednesday May 7 from 6pm to 8pm in Ms. Folsom's room.

4 individuals to work the registration table,


And 2 adults to take-on the roles of Zeus and Hera.

PEDAGOGICAL NOTES-

During a recent afternoon, the Pedagogical Council met to revise Birchtree's disciplinary policy. We viewed this task as threefold, involving the Virtues Project, or perhaps Compassionate Campus; progressive discipline, and a purposeful work program.

The Virtues Project and Compassionate Campus are aimed at developing healthy relationships, giving children and adults alike a common language with which to cultivate moral excellence. We have begun to use components of both of these programs at Birchtree and plan to further them by fostering a more rhythmic buddy system. Each fall, at the Flower Ceremony, we introduce 1st graders to 8th graders, marking the beginning of new friendships. All classes could benefit from being paired with others to share lunch, work, and play.

With progressive discipline, the goal is to articulate developmentally appropriate responses for specific behaviors. We studied the range of frequently occurring misdeeds at our school and identified the need to track them more consistently, to respond more effectively, to provide a space other than the office as a place to regroup, and to refine the RTI process.

Meaningful work provides a proactive approach to discipline by educating the will. This includes activities such as farm chores, grounds work, gardening, or small building upkeep and repairs. Our students demonstrate a great need for developing the will forces to carry out purposeful work. School-wide participation in gardening and animal husbandry holds tremendous potential for establishing discipline in the habit life of a child. To start, teachers and staff can generate a list of tasks that need doing throughout the school. This work would instill both pride and respect for school property. All students should be stewards of the building and grounds. Even if it means working alongside our custodian, school chores need to be divided amongst all classes and carried out regularly. We foresee developing our discipline policy by engaging all students in meaningful work.
